
### **QUALIFYING ANCESTORS**

Those below all represent **Scotland**, but those who changed sides from England to Scotland during the qualifying timeframe may be claimed as loyal to the English as long as they are found in battle on the English side in one of the battles recognized by the Order. They also may be claimed for both England and Scotland if they fought on both sides during the qualifying timeframe.

If any of the ancestors below are used specifically to claim the Declaration option for membership, they shall only be recognized for their loyalty to Scotland for the purpose of claiming the Declaration, as <u>only</u> nobles loyal to Scotland in 1320 signed that document.

- **Malcolm**, 5<sup>th</sup> Earl of Lennox (**Scotland**) (= unk.) Sir James Balfour Paul, The Scots Peerage, 9 vols., 5 (1908):334-36
- Sir John de Menteith, Lord of Rusky and Knapdale, Earl of Lennox and Menteith [(Scotland at Dunbar; England at Robroyston, and labeled an English traitor) captured Sir William Wallace in 1305, and handed him over to Edward I for execution] (= unk.)

- William of Ross, 3<sup>rd</sup> Earl of Ross [(Scotland) taken prisoner at Dunbar, and betrayed King Robert's female relatives to the English at Methven] (= Euphemia de Barclay) Sir James Balfour Paul, The Scots Peerage, 9 vols., 7 (1910):234
- **Sir Henry Sinclair (or St. Clair)**, 7<sup>th</sup> Lord of Rosslyn, Sheriff of Lanark, &c.
