Sir Guy de Beauchamp, 10th Earl of Warwick (**England**) (= Isabel de Clare) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864); Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 287* **He refused to serve in battle.**

Sir Henry de Beaumont, Kt., of Folkingham, Earl of Buchan, &c. (**England**) (= Alice Comyn) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:307*

Sir Maurice de Berkeley, Kt., 2nd Baron Berkeley [(**England**) – captured at Bannockburn] (= [1] Eve la Zouche; [2] Isabel de Clare, with whom he had no issue) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864); Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:331*

Sir Thomas de Berkeley, Kt., 1st Lord Berkeley, Constable of England [(**England**) captured] (= Joan de Ferrers) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:327*

Sir Henry Bohun, Kt. [(**England**) – killed on the eve of the Battle of Bannockburn by Robert Bruce; son of Humphrey de Bohun and Maud de Avenbury] (= Joan de Plugenet) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:413-14*

Sir Humphrey de Bohun, Kt., 8th Earl of Hereford, 9th Earl of Essex, Constable of England [(**England**) – retreated at Bannockburn; imprisoned at Bothwell; killed at the 2nd Battle of Boroughbridge (1322); son of Humphrey de Bohun and Maud Fiennes] (= Elizabeth Plantagenet, dau. of King Edward I of Eng.) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864); Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:420-22*

Sir Gilbert de Clare, Kt., 8th Earl of Gloucs., 7th Earl of Herts. [(**England**) – killed in this battle; nephew of King Edward II of England] (= Maud de Burgh) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 2:203-4*

Sir Robert Clifford, 1st Baron Clifford of Apperby, Westmoreland and Skipton (in Yorkshire), later 1st Lord Warden of the Marches [(**England**) – killed] (= Maud de Clare) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864)*

Sir John Comyn IV, Kt., Lord of Badenoch [(**England**) killed in battle at Bannockburn; son of John Comyn III “Red Comyn” and Joan de Valence] (= Margaret Wake) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:233-34*

Sir Hugh le Despenser, Kt., of Loughborough, Arnesby, &c., Earl of Winchester, &c. (**England**) (= Isabel de Beauchamp, wid. of Patrick de Chaworth) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 2:441-42*

Sir Malcolm Drummond, Thane of Lennox [(**Scotland**); captured at Dunbar] (= an unk. daughter of Sir Patrick de Graham, below) https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Patrick_de_Graham

Sir John de Grey, Kt., 2nd Baron Grey of Wilton, Justiciar of North Wales (**England**) (= Maud de Verdun) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 5:368-69*

Sir Thomas Grey, Kt. Banneret, of Heaton Castle [(**England**) – captured at Bannockburn; father of Sir Thomas de Grey (or Gray), author of *Scalacronica*] (= Agnes de Bayles) [https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Thomas_Grey_\(constable\)](https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Thomas_Grey_(constable))

Sir Gilbert de la Haya (Haye), 5th Feudal Baron of Errol, Constable of the Realm of Scotland [(**Scotland**) – deemed a traitor to England at Methven] (= unk.) *Sir James Balfour Paul, The Scots Peerage, 9 vols., 3 (1906):559-60; wikipedia.org/wiki/Gilbert_II_de_la_Hay, with references*

Sir Richard Lovel, Kt., Lord of Cranbourne and Corfe, &c. (**England**) (= Muriel de Soules) *Cokayne's Complete Peerage (1932), 8:205-7*

Sir John Maltravers, 1st Baron Maltravers [(**England**) – captured] (= Milicent de Berkeley) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 1:147-48*

- Sir William de Montfichet**, Lord Burnbank, Constable of Dundee [(**England** at Dundee; **Scotland** at Bannockburn, though he was *not* a commander at this last place) – grandfather of Sir William de Montfichet who fought after the Battle of Bannockburn] (= unk.) *Evan Macleod Barron, The Scottish War of Independence (1914), p. 388; F. M. Osborn, The Story of the Mughets (1952), pp. 107-8 plus Table I; E. M. Barron, The Scottish War of Independence (1914), p. 388*
- Sir Ralph de Monthlermer, Kt.**, 1st Baron Monthlermer [(**England**) – captured at Bannockburn] (= [1] Joan Plantagenet of Acre; = [2] Isabel le Despenser, wid. of Gilbert de Clare and John de Hastings) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864)*
- Patrick V of Dunbar**, Governor of Berwick Castle, and later 9th Earl of Dunbar (or March as it is sometimes called) [(**England** until after Bannockburn; then **Scotland**) – son of Patrick, Earl of Lennox and Dunbar] (= Agnes Randolph, called “Black Agnes of Dunbar”) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864); https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Patrick_V,_Earl_of_March (with references)*
- Sir Henry de Percy**, Kt., of Topcliffe (1273-1314), 1st Baron of Alnwick (**England**) (= Eleanor Fitz Alan) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864); Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 4:348-49*
- Sir Michael de Poynings**, Kt., of Poynings, &c. [(**England**) – killed] (= Margery/Margaret Bardolf) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 4:421*
- Sir Thomas Randolph**, Kt., Earl of Moray [(**Scotland**) - nephew and supporter of **King Robert Bruce**, though briefly fought for the English after being captured by them, Guardian of the Realm after Robert Bruce's death] (= Isabel Stewart of Bonkill) *Sir James Balfour Paul, The Scots Peerage, 9 vols., 6 (1909):286-94*
- Sir John de Segrave**, 2nd Baron Segrave of West Hatch, &c. [(**England**) – captured] (= Christian de Plessis/Plescy) *T. Wright, The Roll of Arms of the Princes, Barons, and Knights who Attended King Edward I to the Siege of Caerlaverock in 1300 (1864)*
- Sir Henry Sinclair (or St. Clair)**, 7th Lord of Rosslyn, Sheriff of Lanark, &c. [(**Scotland**) – son and successor of Sir William, 6th Lord of Rosslyn; captured by the English at Dunbar and later released] (= Alice de Fenton) *www.clansinclairusa.org/uploads/8/6/1/6/86169372/origins_of_the_sinclairs_in_scotland_.pdf*
- Sir William de Soules**, Lord of Liddesdale, Butler of Scotland [(**England** at Bannockburn; **Scotland** thereafter) – nephew of Sir John de Soules, Guardian of Scotland, above; later plotted against the King and was labeled a traitor and imprisoned] (= ___) *Sir James Balfour Paul, The Scots Peerage, 9 vols., 6 (1909):136; https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/William_II_de_Soules, with references*
- Sir Marmaduke de Thweng**, Kt., 1st Baron of Kilton (**England**) (= Isabel de Roos, sister of William, de Roos who served at Stirling Bridge) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 5:157; W. M. Mackenzie, The Battle of Bannockburn (1913), pp. 89-90; W. E. Thwing, Thwing: A Genealogical, Biographical and Historical Account of the Family (1883), pp. 9-10*
- Sir Pain de Tibetot**, Kt., 1st Baron Tibetot of Burwell, Justice of Chester, &c. [(**England**) – killed at Bannockburn] (= Agnes de Roos) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 5:163-64*
- Sir Ingram/Enguerrand de Umfreville** [(**England** at Berwick, Falkirk, and Bannockburn; **Scotland** at Stirling Castle, 1299 and Lochmaben Castle, 1301, and at the signing of the Declaration)] (= Isabella, wid. of Ailean mac Ruaidhri of Garmoran) *https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Ingram_de_Umfraville*
- Sir Robert de Umfreville**, Kt., Earl of Angus [(**England**) – retreated with Humphrey de Bohun, above; imprisoned at Bothwell] (= [1] Lucy de Kyme; = [2] Eleanor, wid. of Richard FitzMarmaduke) *Douglas Richardson, Royal Ancestry, 5 vols. (2013), 4:14-15*
- Sir Aymer de Valence**, Kt., Earl of Pembroke [(**England**) (= [1] Beatrix de Clermont; = [2] Marie de Chatillion] – **No issue from either marriage, but one son with a mistress.** *T. Wright, The*

Sir John de Warenne, Kt., 8th Earl of Surrey [(**England**) – **Refused to serve**] (= [1] Joan/Jeanne de Bar; = [2] Maud de Nerford)

William Deincourt, son of Edmund - captured

Reynold Deincourt, son of Edmand - captured

Sir Robert de Felton, Kt., 1st Lord of Litcham (= Hawise le Strange) – killed

Thomas de Ferrers - captured

Sir Richard FitzAlan of Arundel, Kt., “King’s Bachelor” – captured – **no issue**

Sir John Giffard, Kt., 2nd Baron of Brimsfield, &c. (= Aveline de Courtenay) – captured

Sir John de Harcourt, Kt., of Stanton Harcourt, &c. (= [1] Eleanor La Zouche; = [2] Alice Corbet)

William de Hastelegh – killed

Sir Edmund Hastings, Kt., of Inchmahome and Kempston (= Isabel Russell) – **no issue**

William le Latimer, (prob. a son of William, 1st Lord [= Alice Ledet], see RA 3:140-41) - captured

Sir Robert de Lisle, Kt., of Harewood, &c. (= Margaret de Beauchamp)

John Lovel, 2nd Baron of Titchmarsh (= Maud Burnell) – killed

Sir Anthony de Lucy – captured

Malduin (Malcolm) MacGilchrist, 3rd Baron of Arrochar – killed

Sir William Marshal, Kt., Marshal of Ireland (= Christian de Burgh) – killed – **issue, but no descendants**

Sir Edmund de Mauley, Kt., of Mulgrave, King’s Steward – killed - **probably no issue**

Sir John de Montfort, Kt., 2nd Baron Montfort – killed – **no issue**

Sir Miles de Stapleton, Kt., 1st Baron Stapleton (= [1] Sibyl/Isabel de Ballew; = [2] Joan Darrell) – killed

Sir Walter Stewart, Kt., 6th Steward of Scotland (= Margery de Brus, dau. of King Robert I Bruce) (I believe he fought for the English, while his wife was very much for Scotland)

Sir Thomas de Ufford, Kt. (= Eve de Clavering, wid. of Thomas de Audley) – killed

Sir Ingram de Umfreville – captured

William de Vesey of Kildare – killed
